ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

April 2024

Report on the Fabric of the Church

The past year has been quite busy and very expensive maintaining the fabric of St Peter's.

The routine planned maintenance continued with service to our clock, fire extinguishers, lightning rods, alarm systems and roof cameras, overseen by our Chair of Fabric, David Ricks. All are in good working order.

Emergency maintenance has been a challenge with the following very expensive projects:

Extensive and expensive repair of dry rot in the Vestry; repair of rainwater hopper at the east end of the south aisle; maintenance to the windows in the bell tower, replacing the bird mesh and installing 'gale breaker' fabric to protect the bells; renovation of the bell workings and frame, undertaken primarily by the ringers who have very successfully raised the required funding; after a fire inspection, fire resistant enclosures were required to be added in the west tower to enclose the gas meter closet and the new electricity consumer board.

In 2024, we will have the quinquennial Inspection. We do not anticipate any major expenditures resulting from it but a prayer in that direction might be in order.

The DIY team continues its valiant efforts, fuelled by coffee, cake and camaraderie!

The Reordering Project David Ricks

After about two and a half years of hard work and upheaval I'm very happy to report that the reordering contract works are now complete.

May I just remind everyone of the extent of the changes that we've made, as they seem to have become very familiar in no time at all? New toilet with accessible facilities, moving the font to form a new baptistry fronting the Greenway Chapel, greatly enlarged open area at the back of church with new chairs, nave altar platform at the east end, new servery, new children's area, porch refurbished and glazed, new welcome area and new meeting room/office with a gallery over for the library.

We still have snags and defects to be put right, and outside the contract we have to provide furniture and fittings for the children's area and the library.

I hope I'm correct in feeling a general approval with the way the works have transformed our church for the better and in the way our church may now be used.

Safeguarding

Safeguarding continues to be an area of high priority within both St Peter's and the Church of England as a whole. Parishes are required to raise awareness of this subject and to ensure that robust policies and practices are in place. The requirements for up to date and regular training are becoming more and more detailed, and there is no doubt that the role of Safeguarding Officer is a demanding one.

I am continuing to update the online St Peter's Dashboard - eventually, this will mean that individuals can log in and check their own 'training due' dates(!). I am pleased to report that all PCC members now have the required current DBS - this follows advice from the Diocese.

I am now working through the other 'requirements' for volunteers within our various roles in Church. My plan is to run some sessions in Church, involving watching the required video(es) over coffee and cake, to facilitate all being able to access them. Even those of us on the coffee rota are required to complete the online basic awareness course! My thanks to our bellringers, who are the first group to be bang up to date with training.

St Peter's has been working to ensure that measures are in place for the 'safer recruitment' of people in specific roles within the parish, paid and voluntary, including those already carrying out the work. These are (i) where an individual has more than incidental contact with children, young people or vulnerable adults who are experiencing, or at risk of, abuse or neglect. Examples are pastoral care and Home Communion visitors, Holiday Club helpers, and bell ringers with training responsibilities; and (ii) those in the parish with overall responsibility for safeguarding: the incumbent, the PCC and the safeguarding representative.

New training is introduced all the time and Safeguarding is a standing item on each PCC agenda and the Parish Policies and Guidelines are reviewed annually by the PCC.

I am looking for someone to help me monitor training requirements for volunteers - if you think you could help, please do let me know!

Safeguarding can often worry people – it's worth remembering that **safeguarding is everyone's responsibility** – raising awareness is vital in ensuring that people feel safe when carrying out work for the Church, safe when in Church, and know who they can ask for help, should it ever be needed.

Deanery Synod

The Tiverton and Cullompton Deanery Synod's meeting in June 2023 included a talk by Brian and Chris Clarke who initially volunteered to work in Amsterdam's red light district and subsequently witnessed the fall of the Berlin Wall. They became inspired to go and work in Bulgaria, a forgotten Eastern Bloc country, where they founded the charity Krasifaid. Four years ago they returned to the UK to live in Cullompton where, unbeknown to them, they discovered a group of about 400 Bulgarians working at the Chicken Factory. These Bulgarians were mostly from the Roma people and not the Bulgars, they were used to being ostracised. They were surprised to find British Bulgarian speakers. Brian and Chris have been working to improve the acceptance of these people in Cullompton.

In October, the speaker was Sharon Blyth (Children and Families Mission Enabler in Exeter Diocese), who gave a talk titled "The Biggest Mission Field". Sharon's talk was entertaining, interactive and practical – encouraging the deanery synod to draw on ideas from their own childhoods and sharing suggestions to take back to their parishes about ways to encourage children and young people into

their churches. Sharon invited us to think about what is needed in the diocese? – volunteers, recruitment and training, and reaching out together; where are the children? – in schools, parks, cafés, shops, youth groups; and ideas of how we can help – reading to children in schools, school governance, acts of kindness, finding gaps in the school curriculum, prayer groups, picking up on festivals and special events. Sharon focused on what favourite aspects of school and church children will remember and highlighted that grandparents matter in influencing faith among children and teenagers.

In February the Deanery welcomed the Revd Nathan Kiyaga, the outgoing Torbay Area Dean. He explained how the Torbay Deanery has forged links with Devon County Council and other community services to form "Torbay United", a charity which aims to offer support for schools and the community through faith and other initiatives. Our Rural Dean, Andy Humm then introduced 'Lifepath Tiverton' which will run in June for all year 4 children to engage in art, history, drama, music and the Christian faith through learning about the Wesley family. This a collaborative project in the Deanery and we hope that some members of St Peter's will also be taking part.

Baptism Team

We have been able to serve coffee and biscuits every Sunday over the past year, which is always very welcome, and a very important part of the morning Service.

There are five teams to cover each week, but we would like to get at least a couple more teams, so that the rota could be worked on alternate monthly duties.

You have all been very generous adding to the donations pot, and so we have raised nearly £500 to help towards Church expenses, and this is after we have bought several items for the 'new kitchen', drawer liners, kettle etc, etc. So, thank you for your support.
